


Community Profile



Welcome to the Municipality of Kincardine

The Municipality of Kincardine is located along the shores of Lake Huron in southern Bruce County. The community is located on the traditional lands and treaty territory of the Saugeen Ojibway Nation, which includes the Chippewas of Nawash Unceded First Nation and the Chippewas of Saugeen First Nation whose ancestors were the first to inhabit, care for and live on this land.

Kincardine is an attractive destination for tourists, businesses and individuals seeking a quality of life. It is home to a world class nuclear energy cluster and known for stunning natural landscapes, robust agriculture sector, rich Scottish heritage and beloved community events.

The community is conveniently located about 3 hours northwest of Toronto with easy access to Kitchener-Waterloo (140km) and London (152 km). With Provincial Highways 9 and 21 in the community, the highway commercial area experiences traffic volumes of up to 8,600 vehicles a day*.



Demographics



Population and Projected Growth





Labour Force

We proudly host one of Canada's leading energy clusters in the Municipality of Kincardine. Bruce Power is one of the largest operating nuclear facilities in the world — its eight reactors generate approximately 30% of Ontario's electricity. This internationally recognized facility is creating clean energy and lifesaving medical isotopes.

Our labour force is well-educated, with over half having graduated from a university or college program. This skilled, full-time population creates opportunities while taking advantage of a prosperous, local agri-business sector.

The Municipality of Kincardine has 262 farms, totalling almost 65,000 acres, and equates to approximately \$100 million dollars in business annually.



Agriculture




Highest Educational Attainment




Business Size by Number of Employees




Resident Commute Times












